2007 GJCA Officer Training

The 2007-2008 GJCA Officer Team pushed their retreat to the limit this year with a new venue and new ideas. After dinner and a brief tour of the GCA office in Macon, the team traveled to Camp John Hope in Fort Valley, Ga. to begin their “Brainstorming” session. The officers worked throughout the night discussing and reviewing new ideas to be implemented in the upcoming year’s programming. The primary focus was on membership recruitment and shaking up enthusiasm for the future of the junior cattlemen’s programs.



The team resumed their enthusiasm by reviewing their brainstorming ideas from the previous night and prioritizing for their final planning session. Before making final plans, Julie Sims, Communications and Membership Director, did a leadership training session to demonstrate the importance of building relationships with fellow officers. Two key points were discussed – communication and trust. Each team member was asked to share a recent experience where they learned how to better overcome the pitfalls that sometimes lead to poor leadership. In relaying the

message of trust John C. Maxwell was quoted, “Trust is the foundation of leadership”. This quote emphasized that while communication is key but building trust is the foundation of being an affective leader. The team was also asked to answer numerous questions on their expectations for the year and what they hoped to give back to the organization during their time of service. Following the time of sharing, the group then learned their style of leadership – mover/shaker, negotiator, bottom liner or wild card. 1. Who brought the first cattle to North America?

Christopher Columbus brought cattle with him to the Western Hemisphere on his second voyage to the New World in 1493, but Hernando Cortez was the first to bring cattle to North America in 1519.

2. What is the connection between beef and the name Uncle Sam, symbolizing the United States?

During the War of 1812, a Troy, New York meatpacker, Sam Wilson, obtained a contract to supply beef to the Army. Wilson, who was known locally as “Uncle Sam,” shipped the meat salted, in barrels. The barrels, being government property, were branded “U.S.” and the teamsters and soldiers joked that the barrels were the initials of Uncle Sam himself. Later, anything marked with the same initials (as much Army property was) also became linked with the name Uncle Sam and led to the idea that Uncle Sam symbolized the Federal Government and the association stuck.
